Academic Focus

- Writing Focus: Students and teachers completed the expository writing unit despite the number of snow days in the month of February. Of the Six Traits of Writing criteria, teachers focused instruction and learning activities on ideas (staying on topic), organization (logic sequence of information), and conventions (capitalization, grammar, punctuation, and spelling). As a school, students scored between 15-25% proficient in these three areas on the cold writing prompt. By the end of the unit, 75-85% of student scored proficient on the final product.
- Literacy Night: On Tuesday, February 26, Blue Ridge hosted its annual Literacy Night with a Dr. Seuss theme. Parents and students had the opportunity to interact with Dr. Seuss texts in various forms with different activities. Favorites of the night were Dr. Seuss Trivia using Kahoots and making Oobleck out of cornstarch and water. Families also enjoyed breakfast for dinner with Chris Cakes catering.

Academic Focus

 For the month of February, Kindergarten students were working on segmenting and blending three sound words. This skill sets the foundation for not only reading but also writing. The students are excited to realize that they are readers and writers. First grade students are experiencing great progress as a result of targeted reading interventions during DRI (Differentiated Reading Instruction) time. A total of 6 students have moved into a more advanced skill level instructional group this month and teachers look forward to more growth and movement in the next month. Second graders have been learning how to subtract 2-digit numbers with shifting a 10 and have been learning about and researching famous African Americans during writing time. Eighty-eight percent of 3rd grade students scored proficient or higher on their S.M.A.R.T. goal of measuring to the nearest 1/4 inch! Fourth grade students have been working to appling Greg Tang's 6 Step Framework to solve word problems using addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division and fifth grade held student-led conferences this month allowing students the opportunity to reflect on and evaluate their learning so far this year and set goals for the rest of the semester. They presented their reflections and goals to their parents along with artifacts of their learning. It was a great success and teachers were excited to see students take ownership of their learning!
