Academic Focus/Science

• Literacy Focus— The Science Department has been working diligently to define and improve our student's ability to create and review models of different science processes. Our work began with reviewing the Science and Engineering Practices rubric for what students should know and be able to do at each grade level. During our DRT process, we noticed that when given an opportunity to create a model, our students were performing below grade-level on the NGSS criteria. Our team established baseline criteria that we wanted our students to improve on when creating their models. Our focus was the following four areas: A- accuracy; B- Big or uses the space given well so you can see the details; C- Caption or explain the process that the model was showing and D- Detailed labels. In our various grade-levels and topics, we gave students opportunities to create a variety of models over the course of 10 weeks. During our first data review, we discovered the need to redefine our grading criteria and teaching methods to obtain accurate comparable data. As a group, the grade level science teams created a common way to teach and score our models; practicing common grading to align the grading practices. The goal was set to have 50% of our students at the proficient or advanced level by October. Although we did meet our goal at the beginning of October, we decided to practice more samples before implementing a new SMART goal on Analyzing and Interpreting Data. Student models were displayed in each classroom.

Parent/Community/Activity Focus

- Fall Parent conferences Fall 2018 parent-teacher conferences were held on October 16 and 18 at RMS. Teachers were successful in contacting 97 percent of our parents. Home/school communication is critical to the success of our students and striving for 100 percent parent contact continues to be our priority. Parents met with their son/daughters advisory teacher to review grades and were provided positive support from teachers and staff.
- Student/Teacher of the Trister One student per grade level is nominated by their teachers by meeting requirements of RAPS; Respectful, Accountable, Positive and Safe

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behaviors. Students not only model RAPS expectations, but also go above and beyond following school procedures, respect all teachers and peers, as well as support fellow students. Each student is recognized in the trister grade level assembly as well as one teacher; Tom Derrington was recognized for going beyond to support students and the mission and vision of RMS. We are proud to have these individuals positively represent RMS.

- Football season The Raytown Middle School Bluejays once again had a highly successful year. The Bluejays "C-team" ended the season 3-1 which marked only the second loss in the programs four-year history. While other teams had trouble filling a "C-team", the Bluejays had over sixty eager student athletes to fill the ranks. The "B-team" suffered only one loss as well, completing the season 4-1. The "A-team's" season finished undefeated at 6-0. This marks the Fifth Undefeated A-team for RMS football. Few teams have been able to repeat the success of RMS over the last few years. The Bluejays have had seven undefeated seasons in the past eight years. Four "A-teams", One "B-Team", and Two "C-Team" perfect seasons are coupled with many one loss seasons to compliment the winning tradition RMS football has come to represent.
- Cross Country Season The Raytown Cross Country team finished with another successful year with fifteen students competing. As the season progressed, each runner improved their fitness and times with each meet. Newcomers Oscar Borja and Elsa Henry placed in every meet. Lorenzo Berry and Anthony Brown were two returning runners who took a minute or more off of their times from last year.
- Girls' Volleyball RMS Bluejays loved being at volleyball practices, games, and being
 around each other as teammates. We had great parent support. Our players embraced
 the expectations of academics and behavior and were able to display their efforts into
 success on the court. Watching the girls grow from the start of the season until the end
 was a fulfilling and rewarding for RMS.
