## Academic Focus

- In Kindergarten students are working on writing How To Books. The students learned that a How To Book teaches the reader how to do something. This type of writing uses order words such as first. next, then, and last. First grade has been working really hard on place value. Students have been comparing double digit numbers and gaining a better understanding of tens and ones. In second grade students started learning how to make and read picture graphs and bar graphs and how to tell time on an analog clock. Third grade has been busy working on elapsed time word problems and the students are doing great! We are also reading fiction stories and working on discovering character's point of view. Fourth grade is moving right along with our understanding of fractions. Throughout the month, we have used manipulatives, oranges, paper, and chocolate bars to understand fractions, unit fractions, and fractions of different wholes. The students are working to add and subtract fractions as well as compare and order fractions. We are also working to find equivalent fractions. Fifth grade students worked really hard on learning how to multiply fractions. Our goal for this standard was to go from 0\% mastery to $60 \%$ mastery. Students exceeded this goal and $78 \%$ of students mastered the concept! Students in our functional skills classrooms had a great time on their trip to Arrowhead Stadium as they were able to get on the field and into the locker room! They have also been working very hard on achieving their learning goals.
