Academic Focus

• For the month of November, teacher leaders and administration led two vertical team discussions regarding curriculum and instructional practice. First, we examined the vertical progression of place value within the standards to identify gaps in our current teaching practice and necessary next steps to correct these noticings. Secondly we examined Fall STAR data and teacher knowledge about students' academic skills to critically evaluate our teaching to determine if any teaching shifts need to occur. From this discussion the following shifts in instructional practice were determined: teach common mathematics strategies and vocabulary to focus instruction and clarify student learning, use the concrete to teach mathematical concepts at all grade levels and ensure teachers have necessary tools, increase teaching place value up to the thousands in second grade, provide professional development on the 5 components of reading instruction, including the phonics continuum, to upper grade level teachers to ensure the proper sequence and focus of instruction is occurring during Differentiated Reading time, provide quality phonemic awareness instruction in the lower grades up through 3rd grade, provide professional development on effective ways to teach vocabulary, increase teacher oral reading of text to students to model good reading and facilitate a love for reading, and increase the rigor of calendar math in some grades to better prepare students for the increased rigor of standards in the upper grades.

- Our fourth grade music performance occurred November 4th in the school gymnasium. The PTA board spoke briefly to parents prior to the show, informing parents of upcoming PTA events and ways family members can become more involved in the school community. The show was very well attended and the fourth graders did a great job with their speaking and singing roles!

Academic Focus

- Head Start teachers completed the Desired Results Developmental Profile for students.
 Teachers created an electronic portfolio for each student. The portfolio included pictures and observational notes. The notes were used to assess students in 5 focus areas: approaches to learning, social emotional development, language and literacy development, english language development, cognition-math and physical development.
- Amy Thompson, our Head Start Social Emotional Coach, provided professional development about Conscious Discipline for staff. The PD focused on consequences and class meetings.
 Teachers were able to reflect and modify their practices responding to behavior in the classroom. Teachers learned how to support students meeting expectations as well as how to respond to children who need additional skills. Providing support to the students will help to change a child's behavior and increase their success in Kindergarten and beyond.

Academic Focus

- **DRT-** The SMART Goal for NT continues to be same and different. The staff developed a continuum for teaching the skills required to successfully distinguishing letters, numbers and words that are the same and different. This is incorporated into all parts of the day and during small group. During collaboration and DRT the staff is planning on how to incorporate same and different into all parts of the day including small group. The decided to use signs to help with engagement and integrate movement into the lessons.
- Walk- through- Dr. Huff and Mrs. Bielawski both have visited and done walkthroughs during November. Dr. Moore was to visit and conduct walkthroughs but we had a snow day and will need to reschedule. During the walk throughs we have focused on math, noticing the use of same and different in an authentic manner, structures and routines.
- Social Emotional Learning-The staff followed up and processed the Poverty Stimulation and how that has impacted their practices and what needs to be changed based on our new learning. The overwhelming response as been the empathy for families trying to access resources and the limited resource regarding transportation. We also revisited our previous work with trauma and the impact. We discussed how poverty and trauma impacts home visits, conferences and parent events. At this point it was more information and awareness. The next step is what to do make those events more accessible.
- Parents As Teachers Professional Development- DESE requires Parent Educators to meet a
 certain number of professional development hours each year. Recently several staff members
 attended a professional development session from DESE on Mindfulness. They were all
 impressed with how the content connected to them both personally and professionally and
 were looking forward to implementing it with families.
- Parent Educator Observations- This year our entire team of Parent Educators will observe one
 another. An observation framework has been developed that lets Parent Educators identify to
 one another the specific areas of the visit they hope to get feedback from. We hope to use the
 observations as a way to improve our practice and effectiveness with families.
- **Head Start Screenings** PAT has completed screenings on every new Head Start student. This gives us important developmental information for each student.
