 - There are only four High Schools in the state of Missouri that have won three Class 4 District Championships in a row during this time frame '18, '17, '16. Those schools are Sikeston, Vashon, St. Joe Lafayette, and Raytown South.
 - There is only one high school in the state of Missouri that has won four Class 4 District Championships in a row during this time frame '18, '17, '16, '15. That high school is Raytown South.
 - In the past 3 years of Class 4 Boys Basketball, only Sikeston and Ray-South have made the Elite Eight all three years.
 - In the 56 year history of the school we have won 11 State athletic championships which include 4 in Basketball and 4 in Cross Country. During the 1970's when Raytown South was one of the largest schools in the mid-west, we won State Boys Basketball in 1970, 1972, and 1977. We are in a five way tie for 11th place in the number of Missouri State Basketball Championships held by Missouri High Schools and have had 11 Final Four appearances. Our last Basketball Championship was in 1990 with 2nd place finishes in 2003 and 2018.

Academic Focus

- Theatre RMS Theatre students completed their design unit this month, which is the largest project of the semester. Students learned the main jobs that are incorporated in technical theatre. Their project involved selecting their own fairytale, e.g. Aladdin, Rapunzel, Hansel and Gretel in which students designed the set; ground plan and front elevation, costumes, and makeup for every character, set design unit and props in their production. Students showed creativity and enthusiasm by putting their imaginations on the page. Guest speaker were featured and invited in to speak to the class. The <u>Careers in Theatre Panel</u> included an actor, director, stage manager and a company owner. They discussed what they do and how they make a living. In addition, the panel shared pictures of what they do. It was an exciting time for theatre students.
- Debate Debate students recently concluded their Policy Debate unit. Students worked in pairs to prepare and compile a policy debate case that included logical, emotional, and credible arguments. Students completed "In class debates" where they presented prepared speeches as well as taking part in cross- examination. In this unit, the competitive side to these students was revealed as they argued their current events.

 included Harriet Tubman, Rosa Parks, Nelson Mandela, and their parents to name a few. After
 completing an intensive writing process, students presented their commemorative speeches.
